Eliezer Ben-Yehuda dedicated his life to coining new Hebrew words so that Hebrew could once again become a language of daily life and not only the language of prayer. When he was looking for a Hebrew word for 'dreidel', The word he chose - SEVIVON was actually suggested by his son Itamar, who was only five years old.

> And guess who came up with the word 'HANUKKIAH' (the word for the Hanukkah menorah in Hebrew)? That's right -Hemda Ben-Yehuda, the wife of Eliezer Ben-Yehuda, an author and journalist who helped her husband in his linguistic work.




